#### **Bruins blitzed in two** weekend losses

Opponents outscored the Uxbridge Bruins 13-4 on the weekend, as the Clarington Eagles pounded the home team 7-2 at the arena on Friday, and the Chiefs registered a 6-2 win in Lakefield on Sunday.

The Bruins opened the scoring Friday night when Evan Gilbert faked a slapshot on net and passed the puck to Quinn Meek for the goal. Ryan Shier also received an assist. But the Eagles responded quickly, scoring three goals before the first period ended.

The Eagles added two more goals in the second period, including a power-play marker which bounced into the net off Alex Hyde. The Bruins were unable to capitalize when they had a two-man advantage for a full two minutes midway through the period.

After the Bruins replaced starting goalie Andrew Claughton with Christian Lambert at the

# Uxbridge a 'dream come true' for new store owner

"This community is just what I was looking for," says Michael Howell, the new owner of the Uxbridge Canadian Tire franchise.

Howell took over the store last week following the retirement of long-time owner Pat Higgins.

"I've always felt welcome here," Howell said Tuesday, noting that he visited Uxbridge a number of times when he was district sales manager for the area and has known Higgins for years. For Howell and his wife, Jackie, who are currently looking to move to Uxbridge from their home in Whitby, it will be a little like coming home. Howell has Uxbridge connections: his uncle, Micky Jovkovic, owned Uxbridge Travel and the Greenbank air strip for

Howell, who owned a franchise in Mississauga, said he almost took over a CT store in Camrose, Alberta, his home province, but, at the last moment, the Uxbridge store became available and he snatched it up without hesitation. "At heart, I'm a small-town guy," he said.

Howell said it has been a "whirlwind week" for him since taking over. He recognizes that it will be a challenge to put his own stamp on the store when faced with Higgins' legacy in town, but pledged to protect that legacy.

"I'll do whatever I can to keep it going," he said, adding that such events as the Huck Finn days and ladies' nights will continue.

But there will be some changes down the road, he said. The store will undergo a "refresh" inside and outside, starting sometime in 2025. This will include relocating some in-store departments to better complement each other and bringing in changes to some time-consuming staff chores "to make it easier for staff and

Jackie Howell said people in Uxbridge have already made her feel welcome, but added that,

while she and her husband have to live up to Higgins' legacy, they hope to establish their own as well. She is already an involved Jumpstart supporter, having been on five-day fundraising treks in Newfoundland, B.C., and the

For Higgins, his last day came on Feb. 14, when more than 100 friends gathered at the store for a surprise retirement party. The attendees were literally a 'Who's Who' of the Uxbridge community, including members of council and senior township staff and some of the township's leading business people. Higgins' family was also on hand, including his two-year-old grandson, Liam, who was clutching a model Canadian Tire truck.

Dan Pollard of 105.5 radio, acting as emcee, stated the obvious when he said "Pat has been a huge part of this community." He then presented Higgins with the first 105.5 community

#### From the Tax Office

FIRST Tax Installment is due on February 27, 2024 SECOND Tax Installment is due on April 26, 2024

2024 Interim Property Tax Bills have been mailed for all properties, with the exception of properties enrolled in the Monthly Pre-Authorized Payment Plan or tax bills paid by Mortgage companies.

The taxes due are based on the billing date. If your account is currently in arrears, the February 1st interest charge on "Past Due Taxes" is not included on this bill and will need to be paid in addition to the February installment.

#### **Tax Payments Options:**

- In person at Town Hall during regular business hours of Monday to Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. Accepted payment methods are cash, cheque, or Interac debit.
- In an after-hours Drop Box located in the Municipal Office front parking lot. DO NOT DEPOSIT CASH Post-dated cheques are accepted.
- By Mail Payments must reach the Municipal Office by the due date.
- Through Internet or Telephone Banking.
- At most Financial Institutions.
- Credit cards and e-transfers are not accepted for tax payments.

#### Penalty/Interest Charges:

For non-payment of a tax levy on or before the respective due dates of each installment, a penalty of 1.25% shall be imposed on the first day of each calendar month and thereafter in which the default continues. Failure to receive a Tax Bill does not excuse the taxpayer from responsibility for payment of taxes nor liability of any penalty or interest due to late payments.

The penalty/interest charges cannot be waived or reduced by the Tax Department or Council for any reason.

If a reprinted tax bill, receipt or Statement of Account is required for any year's taxes, a fee of \$15.00 will apply.

# A nod to Maud - celebrating 150 years

Uxbridge Township council recently declared 2024, 'The Year of Maud,' in recognition of the 150th birthday of one of Canada's most beloved authors, Lucy Maud Montgomery. Maud's home in Leaskdale, where she lived for 15 years, is a National Historic Sire.

Each week, as space permits, from now until Maud's Nov. 30 birthday, the *Cosmos* is offering a short excerpt from LMM's own journals, written during her Leaskdale years. The journals, edited by Mary Rubio and Elizabeth Waterston of the University of Guelph, are published by Oxford

University Press.

Lucy Maud Montgomery was, for all intents and purposes, an orphan, like many of her heroines. Her mother, Clara, died of tuberculosis when she was only 21 months old, and her father, Hugh, moved to Saskatchewan, in search of a new life, when she was seven. Until her marriage in her mid-30s, she lived mostly with her grandparents in Cavendish, PEI. When she came with her new husband, preacher Ewan Macdonald, to Leaskdale in the fall of 1911, it was a new experience:

"When we came in that first night and surveyed the place (the Presbyterian manse) by lantern light, it didn't look very home-like! Boxes of goods and chattels were scattered about and torn paper was hanging in strips from ceilings and walls. But I had a mental vision of what it would be when we got it all in order, and I ran over the house like a pleased child. It was our home and I was its mistress. No woman ever forgets that delightful sensation - especially if, like me, she has never lived in any house before where she had any rights or privileges beyond those of a dependent child.'

start of the third period, the leagueleading Clarington squad added a short-handed goal before Mark Sifri scored the final goal, assisted by Blake Peters.

The *Cosmos* selected Nolan Winter of the Bruins and Adam Klaas of the Eagles as players of the game.

The Bruins then travelled to Lakefield on Sunday, only to run into the Chiefs' Clayton Shaughnessy. The Chiefs opened the scoring just 11 seconds after the opening whistle. Meek evened the score, assisted by Owen Shier, but then Shaughnessy started his march to five straight goals. His first came on a power play late in the first. His second was the only goal of the second period, coming just 17 seconds into the stanza. Shaughnessy's third goal was a shorthanded effort in the third period and, after call-up Luke Kemp scored for the Bruins, assisted by Ryan Shier and Gavin Graham, the Lakefield dynamo added two more goals in the span of 12 seconds.

The Bruins' final two games of the regular season will be held this weekend when they host the Chiefs at the arena tomorrow (Friday) night at 7:45 p..m and then welcome the Little Britain Merchants for a rare Sunday home game at 2:45 p.m.

With the regular season all but over,

the Eagles top the seven-team PJHL's Orr Division well ahead of the second-place Georgina Ice. Even further back are the Bruins who have wrapped up third place, despite a late season charge by the fourth-place Chiefs.

As of press time, no announcements have been made regarding the playoffs, but all indications are that the Bruins will be manouevred into taking a first-round bye.





# Our two cents

#### The conversation that never ends

We were sitting at the lights at Brock St. W. and Toronto St. on Friday afternoon, looking around at all the drivers eager to start their long weekend. And we hazard a guess that, of the seven or eight cars we scanned, five drivers had a phone in their hand.

Maybe it's because the minimum fine in Ontario for texting and driving is only \$615. The max is \$3,000. Must be quite affordable for many people to text and drive. Lucky them. One could add a zero to that number of \$615 and it still wouldn't be enough to really make an impact on the collective consciousness that seems to think it is still okay to use a handheld device of any sort and drive a motor vehicle.

During one of the more harsh storms we've had this winter, we were driving alongside a car on the 401 and, while we were doing a shoulder check, we noticed the woman who was driving the other car holding her phone with both hands well in view of the window, neither hand on the steering wheel. She must have very skillful knees. It took every ounce of concentration just to try and see the lines on the road and stay in one lane. We can only hope she made it to her destination without killing herself, or anyone else.

Cars and trucks are essentially lethal weapons, not to be driven with knees, or chins, or by buddy in the passenger seat? The average car can weigh anywhere between 1,360 and 2,040 kg. For those not of the metric ilk, that's 2,992 - 4,488 pounds. Forty-five hundred pounds of metal hurtling down a road at a modest 80 km an hour - that isn't going to make a pretty picture when said vehicle hurtles smack into another 4,500 pound piece of metal, all because the driver was texting that she'd be coming home late. Now she likely won't be coming home at all.

More to the point - why are we still having this conversation? Why do we still need to be told not to drink and drive? Have we not heard enough horrible stories, seen enough awful news broadcasts, been touched on a personal level in a way that will make us "get it?" Puts in mind that old Bob Dylan song Blowin' in the Wind - "How many deaths will it take till we learn that too many people have died?" Answer, please.

The ban on using a handheld device has been around since October, 2009. Common sense has been around for eternity. The latter didn't work, so the former had to be put in place. A paltry fine isn't the answer. Maybe issue demerit points. Take away licenses. Take away cars. Or perhaps the worst of all, horror of horror - take away phones.

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

I will also mention an organization called Plug 'n Drive, which has a centre in Toronto where the public, at no cost, can test drive a number of EVs and speak to staff who will help them evaluate which might be the best EV for them personally. Plug 'n Drive does not sell vehicles, they merely offer no-cost educational services.

Catsat-large have no place in a community that values its wildlife.

Another interesting piece in last week's newspaper was the "Our two cents" editorial.

While I appreciate the column and the insights it offers, particularly to the studies that are ongoing due to the influences of climate change, I must take issue with the premise upon which the column is based. The presumption that any robin seen in North Durham is undoubtedly a migrant is entirely inaccurate.

Every winter, many robins (sometimes hundreds) overwinter here successfully, surviving primarily on berries. As the winter passes and local food supplies are diminished, the robins start to wander and become more visible. This is the genesis of the "first robin of spring" for many of us. This winter, in my yard alone, there were over 35 robins feeding on berries starting in early February. Other singles had been seen as early as Jan. 3.

The other assertion in the column that I would challenge is the statement that says any robin arriving early would assuredly die if "real winter came back." This statement is inaccurate, as the robin is perfectly able to survive the harshest winters as long as it can find food (berries) and shelter.

Jim McEwen voiced his displeasure with our federal government's imposition of upcoming 2035 electric vehicle ("EV") mandates. He disputed the claim by federal Environment Minister Stephen Guilbeau that electric vehicles will be cheaper than our current internal combustion engine ("ICE") vehicles. Mr. McEwen then went on to opine that Canadians were going to be unfairly forced to purchase older, used gas and diesel vehicles in future because EVs would be cost prohibitive. The facts in reality are actually quite the opposite! Mr. McEwan confuses a vehicle's

purchase price with the total cost of ownership, yet the two are wildly different. While an EV in most cases is more expensive to purchase than its ICE counterpart, there are substantial savings in fuel and maintenance with EVs, which more Canadian EV's price premium is typically more than recouped within a five year time frame, and suggest that there can be significant financial and environmental benefits to choosing an EV."

#### Frequently Asked Questions, Policies, and Reminders



#### Age of Participants

Our camp programs are designed and programmed for specific age groups. Participants must meet the minimum age requirement within the current calendar year to participate in the camp program.

#### Conduct

UxCamps is proud to provide safe, secure, and welcoming environments for all participants and staff members. Coarse language, bullying, vandalism, or physical or aggressive behaviour is strictly prohibited. Such activity will be recorded, reported, and may result in the removal from the camp and/or facility at the discretion of Management.

#### **Camp Information Packages**

All camp specific program information (i.e., medical forms, permission to pick up forms, etc.) will be emailed to the email address associated with the camper's account by the Thursday evening before the camp start date. Please ensure that your email address, emergency contacts, and camper medical and special request information is up-to-date in our system. Should you have any further questions after reading the camp information package, please

contact the Recreation Supervisor a camps@uxbridge.ca

#### Health and Safety

All campers with a medical concern(s) are required to complete a Medical Form prior to their first day of camp. Medical Forms can be found in the camp information package, which is emailed to the address on file prior to the first day of camp. If a participant has a communicable disease or a current public health concern, we kindly ask that they not attend UxCamps during such time.

#### Camp Inclusion

If your child requires special assistance for one of our programs, please notify the Camp Director by June 7, prior to registration, so that we can properly accommodate you. All 1:1 requests require an interview with the Recreation Supervisor to ensure that we are able to meet the needs of your camper. To meet the needs of as many participants as possible, families requiring 1:1 assistance can request support for up to two (2) weeks of camp. If you have any questions regarding our 1:1 system, please contact the Recreation Supervisor at camps@uxbridge.ca or 905-852-3081.

#### **Allergy Awareness**

UxCamps strives to create the safest environment possible for all participants. Peanut/nut products are not permitted at camp, due to severe camper and staff allergies. All other food allergies (if any) will be listed in your camp information package for that specific week, for parent/guardian awareness. We ask you to please be conscientious while packing camper lunches. Allergies should be listed as a medical concern on your camper's Medical Form. Our facilities are used by the public and although we promote a peanut/nut free environment, we cannot guarantee the absence of allergens in our facilities.

#### Swim Tests

Each camp will have the chance to participate in an hour of free swim at least once per week. Should your child choose to participate, a swim test may be required. A deep end swim test consists of swimming the width of the Uxpool (there and back), in a front crawl, without stopping. A shallow end swim test consists of only one width of the shallow end. A swim test is required if: the camper wishes to swim in the middle or deep end, or the camper is over the age of six (6)\* and wishes to swim in the shallow end without a lifejacket. The passing of the swim test is at the discretion of the lifeguards only. Campers may either be granted full access of the pool, partial access of the pool (shallow end and middle only) or may be asked to remain in the shallow end. \*Please note, campers aged 6 and under are required to wear a lifejacket, as per Uxpool policy, and are not required to participate in a swim test.

#### Sign In/Out Procedures

All campers are to be signed in and out with their camp Supervisor by an authorized parent/guardian. Prior to your camper's first day of camp, please fill out a 'Permission to Pick Up' form located in your camp information package, listing and authorizing specific persons to pick up your child. Those who arrive to pick up a camper will be asked to provide a piece of photo ID matching the authorized person(s) before the camper is released from our care. If you need to update your Permission to Pick Up list

throughout the week, please speak with your camper's Supervisor.

Morning care is available for certain camps and is offered at Elgin Park for drop-offs between 7:30-8:30 a.m. We are not responsible for your camper before 7:30 a.m. Please see camp flyer for availability. Afternoon care is available for certain camps and is offered at the Uxpool for pick-ups between 4:30-5:30 p.m. The late fee policy will apply to those who pick up after 5:30 p.m. Please see camp flyer for availability.

#### Late Fee Policy

A \$5 late fee will apply for every five minutes after 4:30 p.m. that a camper has not been picked up and who is not registered for Extended Care. To avoid a late fee, please consider registering your camper for Extended Care, should you anticipate not being able to arrive on time for pick up.

#### Refunds, Transfers, or Credits

New admin fee in effect: If cancelling a registration \$25 per child, per camp will be applied. Please visit www.uxbridge.ca/recreation to review refund, transfer and/or credit policies.

#### Siloam swan

Thanks to Kevin, a loyal reader, who stopped by to let me know about the tragic death of a beautiful swan recently.

This majestic bird was found dead at the side of the road in Siloam, just up the hill from the Pefferlaw Creek. This was NOT one of our Elgin Park swans, thank goodness. This bird's yellow identification tag number is different from "our" birds' tag. There are also swans in the pond at Mill Run golf course, so sadly it was likely one of those birds.

Why would a swan be out on the road? It's possible it was chased there by a predator, and got hit by a

car. Or, perhaps it was pecking at the grit on the shoulder of the road when it was struck. Birds don't have teeth, and so need to eat small stones to help grind up their food to be able to digest it. Whether it was escaping a predator, trying to get some grit, or for some other reason, it was hit by a vehicle and killed.

What a terrible loss, and incredibly sad for Siloam, and the wider Uxbridge community.

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



# A Catch-up Conversation with Jack Wesselo by Conrad Boyce

Jack, when you grew up in Uxbridge, the town was focused on farming. But you became obsessed with flying. How did that happen? What was the attraction?

I was always fascinated by things that flew. From paper airplanes and kites to the small planes that few out of Greenbank Airfield. My dad took me to airshows and museums, and my grandma was qualified as a pilot, so I had a lot of support from my family. As fortune would have it, a classmate of mine in elementary school was the son of a helicopter pilot: as soon as I got a ride, I was hooked!

How did that affect your choices in secondary and post-secondary education? What does a pilot need to know?

In high school I focused on math, physics, and science courses at the advanced levels. For one of my extracurricular activities I was a member of the Royal Canadian Air Cadet program: this enabled me the opportunity to earn flying scholarships, where I gained both my glider pilot and private pilot wings. I could have then directly entered a college aviation program upon completing high school, however

following the encouragement of my parents, I decided to study aerospace engineering at Ryerson University. I didn't decide to join the military directly out of high school, however, as the military requires all pilots to be officers and all officers must have a post-secondary degree, this decision set me along the right path for my future military career.

Why helicopters as opposed to airplanes? And why the military instead of Air Canada, or flying geologists or surveyors into the far north?

Helicopters are truly mechanical marvels. Comparatively speaking, flying commercial airplanes filled with hundreds of passengers is a huge responsibility. The idea just never really appealed to me. The military was attractive mainly due to the fact that I couldn't have afforded the cost of flight training on my own!

Your career has taken you to some dangerous places, like Afghanistan and Mali. What was your role on those assignments?

In Afghanistan I was a First Officer and a brand new Captain, flying the CH146 Griffon in escort and overwatch roles for other helicopters, road convoys, and troops on foot patrols. I was on the first helicopter rotation that Canada contributed to the allied effort in Afghanistan, landing in Kandahar shortly before Christmas 2008.

By the time I went to Mali in 2019, I was qualified on the CH147-F Chinook, had attained the rank of Major, and was deployed in the Aircrew Flight Commander position. I was responsible for all the flight and administrative oversight of the crews flying both Chinook and Griffon helicopters while also performing my duties as a Chinook aircraft commander.

You just returned from a special course in Maryland, the only Canadian in an exclusive international group. What was that about?

I attended the United States Navy Test Pilot School as a rotary-wing student of Class 163. I primarily flew the Black Hawk and Lakota, but had the chance to conduct brief evaluations of six fixed wing airplanes, from very slow bush planes and gliders to supersonic jets, nine other helicopters including a Vietnam-era attack helicopter, and two drones.

What advice would you give to a young person considering a career in the military, especially in the Air Force?

It's worth it! It's a very rewarding career with a huge set of benefits,

but it also comes with some very real challenges. If you're the type who seeks out friendships you'll do just fine.
