## Provincial award honours local veteran

An Uxbridge-area veteran was recently honoured with the 2023 Ontario Senior Achievement Award. Joseph James (Jim) Parks, a resident of Mount Albert, received the award namely for being, according to the citation given at the ceremony, "relentlessly committed to sharing his stories and keeping the memories alive of other Canadians who fought these battles, ensuring their valuable fight for our freedom is never forgotten."

Parks, 99, was one of 20 Ontario seniors who received the award on Feb. 29, at a ceremony that was presided over by Lieutenant-Governor

Edith Dumont, and Minister for Seniors and Accessibility Raymond Cho. The annual ceremony recognizes noteworthy seniors throughout the province who have helped improve the lives of Ontarians through community service and humanitarian activities, such as volunteering, fundraising, advocacy work and more.

Parks is a member of the Uxbridge Honour Them Well Veterans Outreach Program, run by Tish MacDonald.

"We were delighted to see Jim honoured with an Ontario Senior Achievement Award," says MacDonald. "Jim has always been a passionate advocate for remembrance education. He is a treasured member of our program, and we have been humbled to host him on many occasions at local schools, where he shared his story of service with our students."

According to the Honour Them Well website (Parks's photo is on a banner that is part of the Honour Them Well banner program), Parks was born and grew up in Winnipeg, the son of a First World War soldier. He joined Army Cadets at 10, enlisted with the NPAM (Reserves) with the Winnipeg Rifles and then the Active Force Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders at 15 years of age, and was transferred



## Notice of Statutory Public Meeting Regarding Development Charges

Take notice that Township of Uxbridge Council is holding a public meeting on March 25, 2024, at 11:30 a.m. to discuss proposed development charge rates as well as the policies that will be applied throughout the Township. Council will be considering the approval of an updated development charges by-law on a date following this public meeting.

Development charges are fees on new developments that fund growth-related costs to a municipality which are governed by the Development Charges Act, 1997. The Development Charges Background Study relates to the provision of DC eligible Services which includes Library Services, Fire and Rescue, Parks and Recreation, Services Related to a Highway: Public Works and Fleet, Services Related to a Highway: Roads and Related, and Storm Water Drainage and Control Services. The DC Background Study also includes Development-Related Studies for consideration in the DC by-law but the inclusion of studies would be subject to future legislative changes to the DCA.

The public meeting is an opportunity for the public to review and provide comments on the Development Charges Background Study and the proposed Development Charges By-law(s), as required under The Development Charges Act, 1997.

This Notice is to inform you that the Township of Uxbridge has received a Zoning By-law Amendment Application which has been deemed complete in accordance with the requirements of Section 34 of the Planning Act. The Planning Committee of the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge will hold a statutory public meeting to make available adequate information to the public regarding, and to consider, a proposed Township Zoning By-law Amendment pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, (Henry Eng).

## New family business 'tailor-made' for Uxbridge

Have you set your warmest winter coat aside, ready for the garbage bin, because the zipper broke, you certainly can't fix it, and you don't know anyone who can? A new Uxbridge business can help you keep your coat, and the owners have come from Afghanistan to offer that help.

Rouhina Sadaqat and her mother, Majabin, opened Uxbridge Tailoring two weeks ago, on March 1. Tailoring is a family business -Sadaqat has an uncle, an aunt, and siblings who oper-

ate tailoring shops around Ontario. If one travels to Orangeville, one finds Orangeville Tailoring. Owen Sound - Owen Sound Tailoring. Tillsonburg - you know who to look for. Each one is owned by a member of Sadaqat's family, which hails from Afghanistan. They have all moved here at various times over the past several years and set up their sewing machines in communities that seemed to need a tailoring service. When asked how Sadaqat chose Uxbridge, she explains that a quick Google search revealed that there appeared to be few tailoring or

alteration services in Uxbridge (many home tailors and seamstresses offer tailoring services, but these may not have been found using a search engine).

"It was a choice between Uxbridge and Bradford," says Sadaqat, "and we came to Uxbridge and liked it, so we chose Uxbridge."

Sadaqat explains that she, along with her parents and her younger brother, left Afghanistan in 2019, for what she says were "security reasons." "We were not safe," she says. The four moved to Tajikistan, where Sadaqat found employment at a

clothing company sewing clothes. After three years in Tajikistan, the four, along with Sadaqat's sister and brother-in-law, moved to Canada and settled in Orangeville, eventually setting up the family trade.

"People in Canada are so kind," exclaims Sadaqat. "They are honest and friendly, I really love it."

Moving to Canada meant Sadaqat left her fiancé from Afghanistan behind. The two recently reunited in Iran, and married on Feb. 13. He remained in Iran, and Sadaqat





## Be a reporter: ask questions

A rumour was circulating on local social media sites that the *Cosmos* quickly put to rest. The rumour was that Chances Are was leaving its current location on Bascom Street and moving to the Rexall plaza on Elgin Park Drive. It took just one phone call to the Uxbridge Hospital auxiliary to find out that Chances Are is not moving.

On the face of it, no damage here, but one has to ask: who was the first to start that rumour? Did they hear something they misinterpreted? Did it start as a joke? We'll probably never know. But the rumour would not have spread if someone had just asked one question of the right people.

On YouTube this past weekend, I came across a video "news report" that stated bluntly that Mike Johnson, speaker of the U.S. senate, had resigned. No ifs, ands or buts. The problem is that the whole report was completely false and contained numerous inaccurate statements, including one that said Johnson had held the position for years! He was elected speaker just months ago.

How did I realize that the report was fake? Because, being the news junkie that I am, I know I would have seen reports on every mainstream media if Johnson had indeed resigned. The report, put out by some outfit called U.S. Politic News, was completely fabricated

Then I came across a second video, also put out by U.S. Politic News, that reported Judge Aileen Cannon, who is overseeing Donald Trump's classified documents case, had abruptly ended the trial and declared Trump guilty! Once again, no corroboration from mainstream media - or any other media, for that fact - and full of errors. It was all - excuse the expression - BS!

Neither of these videos was presented as "opinion." Both were put out as "news." Yet YouTube allows such obvious and blatantly false reports to run on its site. I reported both videos to YouTube as "misinformation," but U.S. Politic News continues to upload videos.

I cannot imagine what U.S. Politic News was hoping to achieve with this nonsense, but such fake reports are dangerous, particularly given the political atmosphere in the U.S.

today. There are MAGA fanatics who could see - and believe - such tripe and might decide to take some kind of action. Donald Trump found guilty? Surely Cannon must die!

This danger can be mitigated to some extent if people would start checking facts before accepting anything as the truth. Be a reporter! Ask questions!

For example, if you find it hard to believe a report in the *Cosmos* concerning our council, all it would take is a phone call to either the township or the *Cosmos* itself to check it out. That goes for any article published in this newspaper. There are always ways to verify the facts we have presented. And if you find we have something wrong, tell us and we correct the record. You won't find any corrections on YouTube or Facebook or any other social media.

When numerous politicians from the province, region and township gathered on the old Gan Eden site last year to tell us about the new urban provincial park we are supposed to be endowed with, I asked questions. I pointed out that everyone who spoke at the event had used words like "might," "probably," "perhaps" and "likely," but not one had actually said straight out that the park was going to be. I wasn't about to celebrate a new park without definite assurances. So it should be with everything we see and hear, particularly in this day and age when we have such "news" organizations as Fox News, who regularly spout falsehoods and inaccuracies.

The Canadian government is currently working on legislation to overcome such misinformation and disinformation on the internet in an attempt to reduce the harm that can be done by such postings. An ad the government is currently running says that if something you see or read causes you to raise your eyebrows, just maybe you should dig a little deeper to find out whether it is true or not.

And, as a final thought, holding up your cell phone camera to record something does not make you a reporter. Asking questions of the right people does.

## Are you glad 'it's happening here?'

There I was, a few weeks ago, settling into my TV easy chair on a Saturday night, prepared to watch the Leafs play somebody. And suddenly the screen was awash with picturesque images of rural Ontario. Next, there was a guy in a tractor cab.

"Is this a trailer for a CBC series I haven't seen?" I asked myself.

Then the same guy was offloading sacks from a flatbed near his barn. And there was a lush soundtrack of orchestral music rising behind him. And I realized this was an advertisement.

"It's gotta be a beer commercial," I thought, "because they're the only sponsors who can afford commercial spots on Hockey Night in Canada."

The music fades and a voiceover chimes in. "What if we told you there's a place where it's all happening?" he asks rhetorically. And the scene cuts to a rapid camera pull-back amid people in a subway or bus.

people in a subway or bus.

"OK," I thought. "Maybe this is an ad for an insurance company or a car manufacturer," again because only deep-pocketed corporations such as those could possibly be buying ads on the network in HNIC primetime.

"Pretty high end," I thought.

That was followed by travelling shots of young people in laboratories and classrooms and a voiceover about "people training for tomorrow." Then, swooping drone videos of cars on highways and a bassett hound hanging out of a car window, as the voice says "a place that's building roads and highways." More industrial shots with sparks flying, robotic assembly lines and electric charging stations. "And what if we told you, you already live here?" the announcer says as the Ontario government logo arrives on screen.

It wasn't selling beer, cars or insurance at all. The Ontario government had just unveiled a new taxpayer-funded advertising campaign – called "It's Happening Here" – promoting the Doug Ford administration's economic development, highway expansion and electric-battery production plans. Within days, I began hearing the same spots on radio, seeing them on social media, billboards and transit posters. Promoting what? The provincial government's policies, that's what. This wasn't a product or service ad. It was Ford's Conservatives promoting Ford's Conservatives. And we're paying for it!

To be fair, all governments spend our money to promote their agendas. As Mike Crawley pointed out on CBC recently, in December 2016, then auditor general Bonnie Lysyk lambasted the Kathleen Wynne government for

spending millions in 2015-16 promoting its policies. But the Ford Conservatives love this kind of spending. They did it with their so-called "pat on the back" ads against carbon taxes in 2017. Then, leading up to the provincial election in 2022, Lysyk informed Ontarians that the PCs had spent \$13.5 million on their "Ontario Is Getting Stronger" campaign. And we paid for that too!

The difference is that it's 2024! Ontarians and their public services are straining from post-COVID fatigue, chronic neglect and inadequate funding. Jay Goldberg, the Ontario director of the Canadian Taxpayers Federation said, "We shouldn't be seeing these kinds of ads that are just political puff pieces." What's worse, one can imagine with the Ford government's behind-closed-doors record on Greenbelt mismanagement that they didn't bother to clear such ads with the auditor general. By law they're supposed to.

Now, about financing those "It's Happening" ads? They're ultra-expensive. Let's start with production costs. You've got multiple locations, indoors and out, professional actors, technical crews, production gear and transportation. A day's shooting – with lights, cameras, drones, production professionals, performers and catering – can easy consume \$75,000 to \$100,000, not to mention overtime. And post-production assembly can cost \$20,000-plus per day. Then, there's the placement of those ads ... in primetime. About 10 years ago, it cost advertisers - and governments don't get special rates – about \$95,000 for each 30 seconds of air time on Hockey Night in Canada. Add inflation and the ad executives' cut, and we're talking a million of your taxpayers' dollars for one Saturday night's promotion of the Doug Ford agenda on HNIC.

So, are you glad "it's happening here"? Or, would you be more glad if the Ford government spent those feel-good millions on keeping long-term health facilities safer (remember the government's "iron ring" promise?), more health-care professionals on staff for the next pandemic, and better wages for primary, high-school and post-secondary staff (such as those striking York University educators)?

By the way, did somebody ask if the Ontario government ad geniuses paid to use the copyrighted "A Place to Stand" theme at the end of those TV ads? Or did they just assume that composer Dolores Claman and lyricist Richard Morris are content knowing "it's happening here"?

They will begin at Universal Wings and Burgers (21 Brock St. W.) at



tried to pass the puck out from behind the Bruins' net, it went straight to the lone Georgina forward standing in front of goalie Andrew Claughton and the Ice picked up the


Georgina reached the semi-finals by obliterating the Little Britain Merchants in four games. The Bruins had the bye in the first round.


at the Georgina Ice Palace, 7 p.m.
